AUTHOR BIOS

Richard Barlow Adams

Dr. Parnell Donahue

Dr. Parnell Donahue, (Par) was born and raised on a farm in Minnesota, the third child in a family of nine. He earned his medical degree from the Medical college of Wisconsin and served as a general medical office in the USAF. After completing a pediatric residency he practiced in Wisconsin and Georgia. Although he maintained his practice in pediatrics, his areas of concentration were adolescent medicine and sports medicine.

Donahue currently works part time for the Military Entrance Processing Station where he performs physical exams on military candidates seeking enlistment in the US Military Services.

He enjoys reading, writing, gardening, wood working, and cooking for friends and family – which includes fourteen grandchildren. He has helped care for under insured children at a volunteer clinic; taught in an after-school program for at risk teens; and served on the board of CASA, a program which advocates for kids who end up in the court system through no fault of their own. Tools for Effective Parenting is Donahue's fourth book. His first book, *Germs Make We Sick*, was published in 1975; it was followed in 1979 by *Sport Doc.* Both books were published by Alfred A. Knopf and are no longer in print. In 2010 the popular *Messengers in Denim* was published, *Tools for Effective Parenting* well be released by Tate Publishing and Enterprises, Inc. Mack H. Gray, III

Accomplished huntsman Mack H. Gray, III now opens up and shares his many years of field experience in *The New Hunters: 101 Lessons*, a keepsake-quality book featuring the best of his accrued wisdom on gun safety and responsible ownership. In forthright, approachable language and clear photographic illustrations, he introduces the new enthusiast to serious real-world situations (and the possibly disastrous consequences) that aren't spoken of in standard safety manuals. Mack has been a small and big game hunter for over fifty-five years hunting in seven foreign countries and eighteen U.S. states.

Stephen Hines

In the last twenty-four years, Stephen Hines has published eighteen books with over 600,000 copies in print. Using his skills as a literary prospector, Hines has researched and developed four bestsellers: *Little House in the Ozarks*, (1991; 206,131 printed) "I Remember Laura", (1994; 106,928 printed), The Quiet Little Woman (1999; 215,000 printed), and Laura Ingalls Wilder: Farm Journalist (2007; 5,000 books sold). Little House in the Ozarks was a Publishers Weekly bestseller, and The Quiet Little Woman landed on the USA Today gift book list. (The University of Missouri considers Farm Journalist to be a bestseller from the standpoint of its being an academic title.) His nineteenth book will be Treasures of Heaven, a devotional to be published under the Royal Value imprint from HarperChristian Publishing. It should appear in the next few months.

As a graduate student at Ball State University in Muncie, Indiana, Hines started his career by editing and writing for the *Indiana Oral History Newsletter*. After graduation, Hines moved to Asheville, North Carolina, to work as a copy editor for *The Presbyterian Journal*, now called *World* magazine.

From Asheville, Hines and his family moved to Nashville, Tennessee, to work for Thomas Nelson Publishers where he eventually became managing editor. After several years at Thomas Nelson, he went to work as editor for Wolgemuth & Hyatt, Publishers, and then went to M. Lee Smith Publishers. Now he writes and edits from his home.

Tiffini Johnson

Once upon a time, a blue-eyed, blonde haired girl was born in Memphis, Tennessee. Her formative years were spent traveling across the United States and Canada with her family. She doesn't even remember writing "Sweet Shelby," her first story, but by age 9 was reading her stories out loud to classmates. She uses her own traumatic past as a bridge to helping others realize they are not alone. A joyful teacher, dedicated volunteer, prolific writer, engaging public speaker and compassionate advocate, her first and most revered position is as "Mama." She delights in immersing herself in a wonderland of imaginative games like Elephant in the Jungle, Picasso Days and tea parties. Her current book deals with bullying, self-harm and teenage suicide. She is a chocolate-lover and could play in a creek bed all day. She is an insomniac who writes late at night while consuming plenty of Dr. Peppers! She is a dreamer, an optimist and a storyteller who believes the best stories are the ones we create with our families.
